About Coronavirus

The CDC is responding to an outbreak of a respiratory disease caused by the novel (new) coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2) that was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China and has spread to 60 locations internationally (at the time of this publication), including cases in the United States. The virus is known as the “coronavirus disease 2019” (COVID-19); It is thought to spread mainly from person to person or through respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.ⁱⁱ

Scope of Cleanup Protocol

Armor Restoration professionals can perform a proactive cleanup that involves facility or structure cleaning and disinfection where the customer states that there is no active known threat of COVID-19 contamination or exposure. The premises will need to be void of all people and animals during this process especially if an indoors disinfection is needed. The customer will be required to acknowledge that cleaning and disinfecting will only apply to the current state of the structure and contents. The structure would not be protected from future COVID-19 contamination if an infected person was to enter and occupy the building.

Cleanup Scope of Work and Planning

The CDC encourages cleaning of high-touch surfaces such as counters, tabletops, doorknobs, light switches, bathroom fixtures, toilets, phones, keyboards, and tables at a minimum.ⁱⁱⁱ These same surfaces are mentioned in the CDC’s guidance for commercial spaces as well.^{iv} Including:

Kitchen/food Areas – tables/chairs, countertops, food contact surfaces, salt/pepper shakers etc..

Bathrooms – bathroom stalls, floors, sinks, soap dispensers, toilets, diaper changing stations, etc..

Classrooms – book covers/binders, carpets, chairs, doorknobs, mats, etc..

Offices – computer equipment, light switches, tables/desktops, telephones, water fountains, etc..

Retail Spaces – computer equipment/registers, displays, fitting room stalls, mannequins, inventory, etc..

Hallways – carpets, decorations, doorknobs, handrails, staircases, etc..

Other – elevator cars, fitness equipment, lamps, lockers, playground equipment, storage bins, etc..

Cleanup and Disinfecting Procedures

Cleanup procedures generally include cleaning of porous and non-porous surfaces, disinfecting of non-porous surfaces, cleaning and disinfecting of equipment, tools, and/or supplies used for cleanup process, and disposal of waste.

The CDC recommends usage of a labeled hospital-grade disinfectant with claims against similar pathogens to the coronavirus. The products that we use at Armor Restoration to disinfect contain the EPA-approved emerging pathogens claims. While there is currently no product tested against this particular strain of the coronavirus, we are following all guidelines as provided by the CDC and local authorities.
